There were many more events throughout the year, too many to list here. If your event was not listed here, forgive me and let me know so I can mention it in the next issue.


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IPA R2's First Patch Collector and Police Memorabilia Collector's Show March 21, 2020 Barrie, Ontario

"Merci, Ottawa

Many saw my post last weekend about visiting Ottawa from the US for the Sens/Hurricanes game. While there, I had the honor of attending your Remembrance Day ceremony. My wife and I waited an hour and a half to get a good view and to say it was life changing would be an understatement.

I have served in the US military for 10.5 years now and I my unit is gearing up for another deployment to the Middle East next month. The amount of respect that has been instilled in Canadians for their great military and the ones that have given the ultimate sacrifice is beyond words.

While we do have a day to remember our fallen, where I live in North Carolina has nothing like it. Our Memorial Day has turned into businesses marketing sales for the their products and average citizens using it as a day off work to go to the beach or barbecue. The true meaning has been lost. But not in Canada. No. You all understand the sacrifice these men and women have made and choose to stand outside in the freezing cold for hours honoring their memory. Tears streamed down my face as I watched the pride in your eyes as different branches of your armed forces marched past, the claps for the veterans, some in wheelchairs and some barely able to stand as they put their age and pain aside and marched past in formation. It was beautiful.

I will be wearing a poppy every year from now on. I told you it was life changing and I meant it. Your fallen will never be forgotten by this American, no matter what happens. Thank you for being such hospitable hosts and showing me there still is hope and pride in the greats who have walked before us."

This letter was written by a U.S. soldier who was visiting Ottawa to watch a hockey game. As he stayed in Ottawa for a couple of days, he decided to attend the National War Museum on November 11. This is where this American soldier had his life changing moment. We thank him for his service

LORRAINE LOWE (Wife of Member Art Lowe)

Like one of Lorraine's favourite country music stars, Dolly Parton, has famously said, "If you see someone without a smile, give them one of yours". Lorraine Lowe has dedicated herself to helping people smile a little easier. Whether through her fundraising and advocacy efforts or by helping to ease their troubles by listening and being a good friend and neighbour. Soft spoken, polite and reserved yet stubborn in the face of adversity and determination to do everything she can for a cause she believes in. Lorraine Lowe has worked hard her entire life and now at 80 years old, she's working hard to help inspire as many older adults as possible to get out there and do things, to get out there and volunteer for causes they believe in. Lorraine is compassionate and filled with ideas to help people in her chosen community and she wants others like her, seniors, to pitch in where they feel they can help too!

Lorraine has lived in Simcoe County for more than 50 years. She worked at Woolco before getting hired on as an "on-call" housekeeper at Royal Victoria Hospital (RVH), where she worked to obtain a full-time housekeeping position that she worked at until her retirement. Lorraine is very proud of her work at RVH, she says, "Like a wagon wheel, everyone has their own part in a hospital, and every part is important."

Lorraine is grateful for and devoted to her family, she has two sons and a daughter and is the proud grandmother to thirteen grandchildren. It was her devotion to her family that led her to her enriching volunteer experiences. She first started volunteering in her early 60's to support and "give back" to the Epilepsy Association of Ontario for all the support and care they provided her family and one of he grandchildren. It was through this volunteer experience that Lorraine says she first witnessed the impact that volunteers can have on an organization and on a community. Since starting to volunteer, Lorraine has lent her time, personality and determination to many community organizations and causes, including; homelessness issues, bullying in schools, the Metis, and Elder Abuse, among others. But the organization she has come to feel most passionate about and for which she has dedicated herself most, is the Women and Children's Shelter of Barrie.

In the past, Lorraine has had friends and loved ones seek support, shelter and resources from the Barrie Women and Children's Shelter, a non-profit organization dedicated to providing emergency and short-term temporary housing, counselling services, supports and resources to women and children who have experienced the effects of domestic violence. While people often think that these resources are for "other people" and that a community like Barrie isn't greatly affected by domestic violence, the Women and Children's Shelter of Barrie supports more than 1,000 people every year. Domestic violence doesn't discriminate and can happen to you, your neighbour, your friends and your loved ones. Lorraine has seen how important an organization like the Women and Children's Shelter is to the community of Barrie, and she understands how important volunteers are to maintaining the organization's services and

supports.

Over the years, Lorraine has hosted garage sales and donated the proceeds of the garage sales to the Women and Children's Shelter, in addition to selling scarves, and amassing donations to support her participation in the Shelter's annual fundraising event, "Walk a Mile in Her Shoes", that raises money and awareness of violence against women by literally having men (and other community members) walk one mile in women's high-heeled shoes. While Lorraine no longer walks in this annual fundraising event due to recently overcoming a stroke she had in July 2018, she still actively fund raises to help the organization. Lorraine is adamant that everyone can do something. She says that as she got older, and even as she has overcome the effects of her stroke, she has had a lot of people support her to continue to do what she can to not give up working for what she believes in. Lorraine is the first to admit that she couldn't be as active as she is without the help and support from her husband Art, and other important people in her life. "I have a lot of help – people believe in me and I have a lot of good people around me," she says. "People don't realize that seniors have a lot to give" Lorraine says. She continues to give her time and to fund raise and she encourages others to do the same.

In a similar vein and in recognition of Lorraine's hard work, Lorraine was a recipient of the Ontario 150 award in 2017. This award was given to her for her selfless volunteer work in the community by the Province of Ontario.




